- Homework:
  - $\rightarrow~$  There will be 6 7 homeworks. The one with the lowest grade will be dropped when calculating final grades.

- $\rightarrow$  Collaboration is encouraged. However copying others' solutions is not allowed.
- $\rightarrow~$  Homeworks will be announced and collected in class. Check "Announcements" in the course webpage for dates.
- $\rightarrow$  Graded homeworks will be returned in class no more than one week after collection.
- $\rightarrow$  Each homework will be graded as if it carries 30 points.
- $\rightarrow$  Homework problems with "(optional)" in it do not carry any points.
- Quiz:
  - $\rightarrow$  There will be 4 5 in-class quizzes. Each will take 25 mins and has one problem.
  - $\rightarrow$  Each quiz will be graded as if it carries 10 pts.
  - $\rightarrow$  The highest two grades will be used when calculating the final grades.
  - $\rightarrow$  Quizzes are open book/notes. You can also bring your favorite references.
- Final:
  - $\rightarrow$  Problems from the textbook will carry at least 50% of the points in the final exam.
  - $\rightarrow$  There will be "bonus" problems carrying extra 25% of points.
  - $\rightarrow$  Final is closed book.
- The grades will not be curved. In particular, one gets A+ if and only if the overall grade is more than 100%.

## • Missed Assignments:

A student who cannot write a term examination or complete a term assignment due to incapacitating illness, severe domestic affliction or other compelling reasons can apply for extension of time to complete an assignment. Application for deferral of term work worth less than 20% of the final grade can be made in writing to the professor, with supporting documentation, within 48 hours of the missed exam or assignment due date. Application for a deferral of term work worth greater than 20% of the final grade must be made to the professor within 48 hours of the missed exam or assignment due date and must be supported by a completed University of Alberta Medical Statement Form or other appropriate documentation (Calendar section 23.4[3]). Deterral of term work is a priveledge and not a right; there is no guarantee that a deferral will be granted. Misrepresentation of Facts to gain a deferral is a serious breach of the *Code of Student Behaviour*.

## • Deferred Final Examination:

A student who cannot write the final examination due to incapacitating illness, severe domestic affliction or other compelling reasons can apply for a deferred final examination. Such a application must be made to the student's Faculty office within 48 hours of the missed examination and must be supported by a completed University of Alberta Medical Statement Form or other appropriate documentation (Calendar section 23.5.6). Deterred examinations are a privilege and not a right; there is no guarantee that a deferred examination will be granted. Misrepresentation of Facts to gain a deferred examination is a serious breach of the *Code of Student Behaviour*.

### • Reexamination:

A student who writes the final examination and fails the course may apply for a reexamination. Reexaminations are rarely granted in the Faculty of Science. These exams are governed by University (Calendar section 23.5.5) and Faculty of Science Regulations (Calendar section 182.5.9). Misrepresentation of Facts to gain a reexamination is a serious breach of the *Code of Student Behaviour*.

## • Student Responsibilities:

– ACADEMIC INTEGRITY:
